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Hockey games streaming

The best game streaming services can connect you with great video games in minutes instead of hours. Instead of downloading games to a console or PC, you can stream them directly to a device of your choice. Whether you want to pay a monthly fee to access a full library of games, buy new games à la carte or use your existing collection, there are cheap, easy-to-use options at your disposal. There just aren't that many. While there are some niche game streaming services, there are only a handful of popular, easily accessible ones. Still, those discussed in our best game streaming services page should give you a pretty good baseline. If one of them meets your needs, go ahead and subscribe; if not, there are other services out there. Be warned that they are generally a little more expensive, a little harder to use, or a little harder to get on your platform of choice. Read on to learn more about our choices for the best game streaming services, as well as the benefits and limitations each holds. What are the best game streaming services? Currently, there are only three major game streaming services for sale: Nvidia GeForce Now, PlayStation Now and Google Stadia. Technically, there are many more game streaming options, from PS4 Remote Play on Android phones to Steam's ability to stream across multiple computers. But in terms of ready-made, download-an-app-and-go programs, these are the three great programs you're getting right now. We'll definitely get at least one more within the next year, but it's a volatile market, and it's hard to say which services will come or go in general. Microsoft's ambitious Project xCloud is also available in wide release, now called Cloud Gaming (beta). Since the service is still technically in beta, it is not yet included here, but it is already an excellent option with over 100 games available. Right now, we can say that Nvidia GeForce Now is the best game streaming service if you already have a library of games on Steam, Uplay or the Epic Games Store. PlayStation Now is the best game streaming service if you want a pre-built library of hundreds of games, but you don't like owning them long-term. And Google Stadia is the best game streaming service if you just want to buy games à la carte, one by one. Better yet, it uses your existing library so you don't have to spend a penny to try it out. How the system works: you download the GeForce Now app on a system, such as a PC or an Android device. Then link the service to your Steam, Uplay, or Epic Games library. You install a compatible compatible on an external machine, play it on the platform of your choice. It's a little complicated in theory, but in practice, it's a smooth and seamless process. The system has a few possible drawbacks. Not every PC game is compatible, and while many publishers have added new games to the GeForce Now library, other publishers have taken them away from them. In addition, the free tier ensures that you wait in a queue and limit your playing time. So does the paid low, in fact, although it does have a much shorter queue and a much longer time limit. (Image credit: Sony) PlayStation Now is the only major game streaming service that works on a subscription model, and it works very well, at that point. You'll need to deliver your own DualShock 4 controller, as well as a monthly subscription fee and a PC or PS4. Next, Sony offers the game library, which consists of more than 650 PS2, PS3, and PS4 hits. Some of the games are permanent in the library; others run in and out on a monthly basis. What is impressive about PS Now is the quality of the games you get. Series like God of War, Resident Evil, Ratchet & Clank, Red Dead Redemption and Uncharted are all present and responsible, and you can play the full games at 1080p resolution. The PC and PS4 apps both work well, so it's also a good opportunity for PC gamers to get a taste of exclusive PlayStation titles. Google Stadia is in theory what the best game streaming services will look like in the future. You buy individual games just like you would for a console or PC, but you play them on almost any platform you want. Stadia streams via Chrome to virtually any computer, to TVs via Chromecast Ultra or to a handful of Android smartphones via the Stadia app. Take every controller you want to take with you for the ride. Stadia generally streams well and has some interesting games on offer, such as Assassin's Creed Odyssey and Doom Eternal. But even if it runs at a full clip, Stages graphics don't look as nice as their PC or console counterparts. Moreover, the library has grown slowly, and it has no killer exclusive titles. How to choose the best game streaming service for you The best game streaming service for you generally comes down to how you prefer to buy your games. If you already have a good gaming PC and are just looking for a way to play your games on a TV or phone, Nvidia GeForce Now is your best chance. You don't have to buy your games again and you don't even have to pay for a subscription if you're willing to be patient and take regular breaks. If you don't play many games PlayStation Now is a smart bet because it comes with a huge library. You're almost guaranteed to find something you love, whether you're in action RPGs, racing games or sims. If you don't like the idea of renting games indefinitely instead of owning them, though, it's probably not the service for you. Google Stadia works if you don't have gaming-quality hardware in your home, but still want to try out some tough titles. You still have to pay full price for the games you play, but at least you don't have to buy an expensive console or PC. How we test game streaming services While Tom's Guide doesn't always write full reviews of the best game streaming services, we've tested them all in recent years as part of other stories. We evaluate them just like any other streaming service. We play games for at least an hour at a time, and evaluate how well the service works on different types of connections (wired, wireless, home, corporate, etc.). We also take into account the interface of a service, the selection of the game and the variety of platforms on which it is available. The most important part of the evaluation is whether a service streams seamlessly, or whether it encounters delay, cracks, or freezes on an otherwise strong connection. Game library is also a huge consideration, especially since it is impossible to tell if a particular gamer will have the big, popular games available on almost every platform. Price is a secondary concern because none of the services is terribly expensive, although anything with a high quality free tier gets our nod of approval. Try the best gaming headsets View the best streaming services A relatively new addition to the game industry, game streaming services give players remote access to some of the best titles on the market. Each service works a little differently than the next, but essentially, these services allow users to stream video games to their screen in a way similar to Netflix or Hulu. That means you don't need a fancy PC or a lot of storage space on your console to play high-fidelity games – instead, all you need is a stable Internet connection. Anyone looking for a relatively affordable way to access hundreds of games without upgrading their hardware will find a lot to love with these services. Although the technology is new, the market is already becoming full of companies looking to create the next big thing. These are the best game streaming services currently available. Xbox Game Pass (Xbox One, *PC) Kicking off the list is perhaps the best example of a streaming service, Xbox Game Pass. The other services on our list depend on streaming technology to deliver your games to you, but Microsoft's Xbox Game Pass works a little differently. For \$10 a month, an Xbox Game Pass subscription gives you access to over 100 games and downloads them on your Xbox One storage device, just like with your Xbox One other digital game. This means you don't have to worry about your internet speed affecting the quality of your gaming experience, and even if you lose your connection, you're still playing games, so if you stay a member. And the games - the games. Xbox Game Pass has arguably the best library of free games of any service in our list. From Rise of the Tomb Raider to Gears of War 4, almost every notable Xbox One game you come up with is included in the program, and a selection of Xbox 360 games is also available through backward compatibility. It is also not limited to games published by Microsoft, with a variety of third-party games also available. The kicker, however, is Microsoft's policy for future Xbox exclusives. All xbox games from the first party offered in the future will be included with an Xbox Game Pass subscription on launch day at no extra cost. That means games like Halo Infinite, the next Forza Motorsport, Gears and the mega-popular Grounded are all available on day one via Game Pass. Speaking of Grounded, that's a great example of a game available through Microsoft's Game Preview program – which allows users to play a game in what is effectively beta form. It's another perk of having Game Pass and is a leading example of a subscription service well done – both from an economic point of view, and in its excellent selection of games. * Only Xbox Play Anywhere games are also available on PC via Xbox Game Pass. PlayStation Now (PS4, PC) Sony has some of the best first-party video games around, but you previously had to own one of the company's consoles to play them. PlayStation Now lets you play a wide range of exclusive PlayStation games from your PC or playstation 4. On PC, all you need is a DualShock 4 controller with a wireless adapter or USB mini cable, a PlayStation Network account, and at least 5 Mbps download speed on the Internet. PlayStation 4 users need the same internet speed on their game console, and with a free seven-day trial or paid subscription, you're ready to play the best PlayStation exclusives. For PS4 players, a PlayStation Now subscription provides full access to multiplayer support, even if you haven't subscribed to PlayStation Plus yet. Your files to store are compatible with both PC and PS4. The service has added a feature that comes with Xbox Game Pass: the ability to download games and play them directly on your system. More than 250 PlayStation 4 games are eligible for download and support dic and other features you would get in the standard digital versions. It's likely that you never need to download them, but doing so in case your internet goes out will ensure that you still enjoy your favorites. PlayStation Now currently includes a number of older PlayStation exclusives, including the first three Uncharted games Killzone: Shadow Fall, The Last of Us, Until Dawn, God of War III: Remastered and It also supports a number of third-party games, such as Dishonored, the Batman: Arkham games, the BioShock trilogy and Saints Row IV. New games are added every month and the full catalog now contains more than 800 titles. PlayStation Now costs \$10 for a one subscription or \$25 for a three-month subscription. An annual subscription is now \$60. PlayStation Now also appears to be getting a potential upgrade, thanks to a collaboration between parent company Sony and Microsoft. The two companies will work to integrate Microsoft's Azure cloud technology - the same technology that powered Project xCloud - into Sony's streaming and AI services. The exact impact this will have on PlayStation Now remains unclear at this time, but Microsoft's data centers dwarf those used by PlayStation Now at this time. As we approach the next generation of consoles, Sony also plans to let players use PlayStation Now on more devices, including mobile platforms. According to Sony, the quality of the content will reach 1080p and beyond, putting it in line with services such as Nvidia GeForce Now, but on the back of what Google Stages and Project xCloud can do. GeForce Now (PC, Mac, Nvidia Shield) Do you have a Mac, Nvidia Shield or a low-end PC, but want to play the latest AAA games? With GeForce Now, you can play the latest and greatest from major publishers without having to worry about your computer on fire or, worse, running Bootcamp. GeForce Now is not a content service like many of the other services on our list. You have to buy the games you want to play through a digital store, such as Steam, Uplay or Blizzard's Battle.net. Once you've installed the app on your machine, GeForce's cloud processors allow you to run the game on any device, regardless of their specifications. The service requires a higher download speed on the Internet than GameFly Streaming - at least 15 Mbps and 25 Mbps are recommended - and you must have MacOS 10.10 or higher or Windows 7 64-bit or higher to run it. An Ethernet connection or wi-fi connection to a 5GHz router is required and you use a mouse and keyboard setting or one of several gamepads. Sessions are currently limited to four hours per player before starting a new session to keep the servers available to other players. GeForce is now compatible with a huge assortment of games, but you do need to buy them to use them with the service. The list includes Assassin's Creed Origins, PlayerUnknown's Battlegrounds, Injustice 2, Sid Meier's Civilization VI and Middle-earth: Shadow of War, to name but a few. Even behemoths like the upcoming Cyberpunk 2077 will be available to play through this service. GeForce Now has completed beta testing and is now available in three different layers. The free version offers standard access with a one-hour play session. The \$4.99 per month Founders option prioritizes extended session lengths, and enables RTX. There is also a temporary high-end option that costs six months \$24.95 and offers all the benefits of the Founders version, but special Hyper Scape perks and exclusive Add. Google Stages Google Stages is Google's take on a streaming service, with the ability to stream games 4K from a Chrome browser. Google Stadia is available to stream on devices such as Android (and ultimately iOS) phones, laptops, tablets and televisions via Chromecast Ultra and effectively replaces the traditional gaming console. You'll have access to some of the biggest AAA games on the service, including Mortal Kombat 11, Destiny 2, Borderlands 3, and Darksiders Genesis, and updates are handled on the server side, so you never have to wait before playing your games. Not all of Stages' most impressive features have been integrated yet, but Google recently showed off its long-awaited connection to YouTube, so you can click on a link from the description of a video you use on Stages. Viewers watching a streamer on YouTube can jump directly into their game to play with them, or use a status sharing system to replicate and play their saved file from where the streamer left off. They can even start playing games directly with YouTube ads in just five seconds, and they can access the Google Assistant for tips on erasing tricky parts of games they play. Stages receives timed exclusive games, with a few hundred titles added to the service in general, and it continues to be updated with new features. However, the service has a long way to go if it wants to compete directly with xCloud or with the upcoming PlayStation 5 and Xbox Series X consoles. That should eventually happen, as Google's internal development staff grows, led by veteran producer Jade Raymond. It also recently acquired Journey from savage planet creator Typhoon Studios. Stadia is definitely one of the most robust game-streaming services today, but we would still suggest waiting until it gets a better game lineup. Still, if you don't have a traditional console, it's a quick way to jump into AAA gaming and you can cancel your subscription if you decide it's not for you. You currently get access to the free version, which caps its games at 1080p resolution. The Pro option costs \$10 per month and enables 4K streaming, along with a library of free games every month and discounts. The main problem with Stadia is in the library, which is currently limited to just over a hundred games – a hard sell when competing with entire libraries of thousands of games on PS4 and Xbox One. Although, it is similar to the services of this platform - PS Now and Xbox Game Pass - at least in terms of price. xCloud Google isn't the only company that wants you to play console-quality games, regardless of your location. Microsoft unveiled its Project xCloud service (now known as xCloud) as early as 2018 and it wants to remove the hardware barrier between its library of games and potential players. It currently has a release date of 15 2020. Microsoft's 54 Azure data centers will allow users to stream xCloud games originally created for Xbox One or PC on their device of your choice. Everything from Xbox One and PC itself mobile phones tablets are eventually supported and you can access your games wherever you have a network connection. You also use your own Xbox console as a server via xCloud without having to pay. Unlike Stadia, which pairs your controller of your choice with your Wi-Fi connection, xCloud does this via Bluetooth, which will theoretically lead to low latency while playing. Xbox One controllers (and Series X) created after 2016 are supported on your device of your choice, and you also have access to custom touch control interfaces when you're gaming on a mobile device. xCloud is currently available for free during the preview phase, but only for those who have already registered on the official website. During this period, more than 50 different games are available to play, ahead of its full release next month. Then, more than 100 titles are available to stream on an Android phone or tablet, PC or Xbox console. You also use it on a Smart TV through the Game Pass app. Because xCloud is built on the same backbone as Xbox Live Gold and the Xbox Play Anywhere program, it supports cross-platform cloud store data. This means that if you're playing a game on your Xbox One or Xbox Series X and you have to leave, you'll pick up your mobile device and resume your progress. The coolest thing about xCloud is that it's paired with Xbox Game Pass Ultimate, which costs \$15 a month, but gives you access to all the benefits of Xbox Game Pass and Games With Gold (as well as a Gold subscription to play with others online). So Xbox Game Pass Ultimate subscribers get access to xCloud at no extra cost – and it's something Microsoft wants to make as ubiquitous as possible so far, whether you have an Xbox console or not. Shadow One of the most technically ambitious game streaming services we've seen so far, Shadow is designed to give your device the power of a high-end gaming PC of your choice – whether it's another PC, a Mac, television, phone or tablet. As with Nvidia GeForce Now, Shadow doesn't require you to buy new games to play. Instead, you can import your current games from stores like Steam, Origin, Epic Games Store or Battle.net and play the games you already have. Currently, Shadow uses a GTX 1080 GPU that can play games in 4K at 60Hz or 1080p at 144Hz. It uses 12GB of DDR4 RAM and gives you access to 256GB of storage, allowing you to install several titles at once. Unlike Google Stages or Project xCloud, you still need to download and update your games, as Shadow essentially lets you rent out a powerful gaming PC remotely. With Shadow Ghost accessories, you can transform your TV into a Shadow device that lets you use controllers, keyboards, and other accessories to play your favorite games via Bluetooth. And if you take your current game to a device, you can even switch to another screen with Shadow while you're still running the game on your previous screen. This eliminates any between sessions. A 15 Mbps connection gives you optimal performance, but you also use a 4G LTE connection to play on the go. A Shadow subscription costs a little more than PlayStation Now or Stadia. The monthly option will cost you about \$15, while a full-year subscription lowers the monthly price to \$12. There is no free trial available, but Shadow does offer a 14-day refund policy.
